

GERANIUM 'Elizabeth Ann'

Origin: Discovered by American Plantswoman Leslie Grayson in Pennsylvania

Species: *Geranium maculatum*

Protection Status: US Plant Patent 11,252. Canadian COPF rights asserted.; COPF Open.

Characteristics:

Geranium 'Elizabeth Ann' is a chocolate foliage form of hardy geranium. With ruddy colored stems this truly a dark plant. In the late spring and early summer this is contrasted with lavender flowers. Perfect as a dark specimen in a perennial border, rock garden, and flower beds.

Hardiness: USDA Zone 4

Bloom: Late spring-early summer, possible re-flower in autumn. Lavender in color

Foliage: Leaves are chocolate brown, with stems, peduncles and petioles a ruddy brown. In the fall leaves turn to the reddish brown as well.

Habit: Upright mound. 18" tall by 12" wide.

Propagation: Division and tissue culture. *License required for propagation.*

Culture: Moist soils, full sun to partial shade.
